Since 1921, Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System has cared for the Upstate — rising in prosperity and persevering through challenging times, together. These past two years have brought their share of each to our community.






2019 FOUNDATION INVESTMENTS IN HEALTH \$3,895,653

'WHERE I BELONG'

John Harrill, MD | 2019 Board Chair

JOHN HARRILL, MD, IS GRATEFUL FOR HIS CAREER AS A RADIOLOGIST AND IS COMMITTED TO GIVING BACK.

John Harrill, MD, enjoyed a career spanning four decades, during which he saw the radiology field revolutionized by technology.

"This is where I belong," he said.

His service led him to become Foundation board chair in 2019.

"We have been tremendously blessed by his leadership," said Foundation Executive Director Kristy Caradori. "Dr. Harrill has a vision for how the Foundation can benefit the health of our community long into the future."

As a radiologist, he has a special appreciation for the Foundation's "exemplary support" for making mammography more widely accessible to women


> in need. Dr. Harrill is excited about the development and use of other diagnostic screening technologies to detect cancer early. He points to the success of low-dose CT screening for

lung cancer, generally recommended for smokers and former smokers over the age of 55.

"It can make lung cancer a curable disease," he said.

As these and other advancements continue to shape the future of health care, Dr. Harrill expects the Foundation to help keep Spartanburg Regional at the forefront.

"I'm grateful for what this hospital and the Foundation have allowed me to enjoy in my career," he said. "It's a big part of my life."







THE LONG VIEW

THE FOUNDATION HAS THRIVED DURING AN UNCERTAIN TIME UNDER ANNE FLYNN'S STEADY LEADERSHIP.

Anne Flynn believes an essential key to leadership is the ability to adapt, learn and "play the hand you're dealt as well as you possibly can." That's certainly what she has done as chair of the Spartanburg Regional Foundation Board of Trustees.

Only weeks after leading her first board meeting as chair, the COVID-19 pandemic brought an abrupt new reality. Meetings took place virtually and annual events were either postponed or canceled. The pandemic would impact the needs and activities of the Foundation.

"Who would have imagined that this would be our situation?" said Flynn. "We can't always control what's going on in the world, but we can choose to see change as

an opportunity to improve and, in our case, address the emerging health needs of the community."

One of the early steps taken by Foundation leaders during the pandemic was the establishment of a new COVID-19 fund to support the health system. The fund assists Spartanburg Regional employees affected financially as well as patients hospitalized with COVID-19.

Meanwhile, Flynn and Foundation Executive Director Kristy Caradori approached members of the Board of Trustees and division boards about extending all board terms another year. Flynn was happy with the result.

"Every single member said yes — that was a powerful statement of their commitment to the health system and the well-being of our community," said Flynn.

Caradori said the Foundation has benefited from Flynn's steady leadership.

"Anne understands what it takes to work with a diverse group of volunteer leaders during changing times," she said. "She is great at remaining focused on the big picture."

Flynn is taking the long view: "Our community had needs before COVID-19 and will have needs after COVID-19. In some ways, the pandemic has brought to light needs and opportunities that will make the Foundation stronger when we come out of this."



\$2 MILLION COVID-19 FUND HELPS THOUSANDS

Trustees establish new fund to address pandemic needs

As COVID-19 emerged, healthcare professionals at Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System acted with courage to confront the virus. At the same time, the Spartanburg Regional Foundation's Board of Trustees took swift action to support needs resulting from the pandemic.

Trustees allocated \$2 million to a new fund dedicated to supporting employees impacted by the pandemic as well as patients hospitalized with COVID-19.

"This new investment is just part of the Foundation's ongoing work to support our hospital system and the community," said Anne Flynn, 2020 Foundation board chair. "We are honored to be able to help in such a significant way."

Businesses, foundations and individuals also contributed to the fund. Early gifts were made by Activision, BMW, Fullerton Foundation and Timken Foundation. SRHS CEO Bruce Holstien made a leadership gift and was followed by others, including Michael Orseck, MD.

"It is important, now more than ever, to support the needs created by COVID-19," said Dr. Orseck. "I'm invested in our system and our associates, and I want to help."

In the first six months of the pandemic, more than 1,500 people received support from the COVID-19 Fund.

Kim Hoffman, RN, was one employee who received help. Hoffman is a nurse in SRHS Corporate Health and manages clinics for Inman Mills. She was diagnosed with COVID-19 during the summer of 2020.

"It was worse than any flu I've ever had," she said. Her illness required a 10-day stay in the ICU. "I truly had the best care," said Hoffman. The help she received was an unexpected and needed boost.

"It meant a lot to us to have this support during such a challenging time," she said.

Although times have been difficult, 2020 Board Chair Anne Flynn is optimistic for the future.

"We will overcome this," said Flynn. "We face this pandemic together — united in our resolve, committed in our love of our community, strengthened by our faith and resilient in our actions."

New society honors Chapman legacy, two-term trustees

The Spartanburg Regional Foundation is grateful for those who have served on its board of trustees since its inception nearly 30 years ago. These community leaders have brought diverse talents and perspectives to the role. They have given generously of their time and expertise and have served as ambassadors for both the Foundation and Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System.

To honor those who have served for two terms — giving 12 years of service — on the Foundation's governing board, trustees have established the Robert H. Chapman Leadership Society. The first group of inductees was introduced in August 2019 at the Society of 1921 Donor Appreciation Gala.

Creation of the society also honors the legacy of businessman, philanthropist and civic leader Rob Chapman, who died unexpectedly in 2017. Chapman was a two-term Foundation trustee and provided instrumental support for such projects as the new emergency center and the Bearden-Josey Center for Breast Health.

John Harrill, MD, 2019 Foundation board chair, spoke at length about Chapman's contributions before introducing the inductees.

"I could spend the next hour discussing Rob's leadership, his kind heart and his impact on others, and I would still never be able to do him justice," he told the audience. "He was a special friend of mine and an amazing man, and his legacy continues to make a positive difference."

Charitable remainder unitrusts were established under the IRS tax code.

"This type of trust is ideal when you have an appreciated asset and you wish to reduce your tax burden while making a positive impact on one or more charities," said Jim Shaw, a Spartanburg attorney who helped execute the gift. "A charitable remainder unitrust will provide annual income to a donor for life, reduce tax burden, and leave the remaining funds to charity."

The Soveys grew up in Georgia and met during their college years. They have called Spartanburg home since the late 1950s, when he came to work as an industrial engineer for Milliken & Co. He became a vice

president at Milliken before going on to lead several other companies.

"Terrell has brought visionary leadership to the Foundation," said Foundation Executive Director Kristy Caradori. "We are grateful for his and Anne's thoughtful generosity, which will make a positive impact on others forever."

From the very start, Anita Butler was a leader who would contribute in any way needed. She also knew how to maximize resources for her patients.

When the Foundation was established, she quickly determined that philanthropy could make a difference.

In the early 1990s, she was director of maternal and pediatric services. One of

the departments she managed was the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).

"I knew if we could put donations toward enhanced training and specialized equipment, it would help our tiny patients," Butler said.

Butler would go on to take new and expanded leadership roles. She retired in early 2020 as vice president of post-acute care, a large and evergrowing area of the health system that includes the Spartanburg Hospital for Restorative Care, Spartanburg Regional Hospice and Palliative Care, home health, senior health, Woodruff Manor, and Ellen Sagar Nursing Center.

Butler was respected for her compassion for patients in need, her loyalty to her staff, and her vision for systemwide change and constant improvement. She was a leader who was quick to give hands-on support, no matter the task.

"My favorite thing about Anita is that she never asked you to do something she wouldn't do," said Kim Ross, who worked under Butler's direction at SHRC and then as

director of hospice. "We would have cleaning days at restorative care, and Anita would be right there alongside us – scrubbing walls, wiping door handles, doing whatever was needed."

Butler remained loyal to the Foundation throughout her career. She is most proud of her role in supporting the Harold E. Fleming, Sr. MD Patient Independence Fund. The fund honors the legacy of Fleming, who died in 2009, and provides equipment that helps patients return home after an illness.

"Foundation funds are special," she said.

MOBILE MAMMOGRAPHY PROGRAM GROWS

Two new mobile units are added with community support

Mammograms save lives.

But for many women, making it to a mammogram appointment can be a challenge. Taking time off work, finding transportation and the driving distance to a fixed site location create barriers for patients. This is why the Bearden-Josey Center for Breast Health mobile mammography program is such an important resource.

In recent years, the program has operated at capacity as demand for screening access has grown. A new mobile unit was needed. Bearden-Josey

Center for Breast Health Director Mary Mabry made a presentation to the Foundation's cancer board — and the rest is history.

Cancer Division board leader Chris Cannon heard Mabry's presentation and contacted the Foundation to help. Chris, his wife Cara Lynn and their family made a \$250,000 leadership gift in memory of Chris's mother, Jeanne Lytle Cannon.

Others soon followed their lead. Leadership gifts came in from the Fullerton Foundation and the Timken Foundation. Additional support was provided



by companies that utilize the mobile mammography unit, including Contec and Inman Mills. The mobile mammography program was featured as the beneficiary of proceeds of the 2018 Uplifting luncheon and was a focus of the employee campaign.

In all, more than \$800,000 was raised to help purchase two new mobile mammography units, which were delivered in 2020. They are now on the road, serving women at convenient locations such as workplaces, churches, physician offices and community centers.

"The new units help us expand our reach, thereby increasing annual screening rates, detecting breast cancers at an earlier stage when most treatable and, most importantly, saving lives," Mabry said.

Having two mobile mammography units providing access to the Upstate will expand screening capacity to approximately 7,500 women annually.

"We are proud to support the mobile mammography program," Cancer Division board chair Betty Montgomery said. "There was such enthusiasm for this project. We are truly grateful."

EXPANDED GIBBS CANCER CENTER OPENS

The expanded Gibbs Cancer Center & Research Institute at Pelham opened in March 2020. The seven-story facility features advanced technology and other essential resources for patients and caregivers – from conference areas where multidisciplinary team meetings are held to discuss patient cases, to spaces for physical rehabilitation and community education, to infusion rooms that look out onto the Blue Ridge Mountains. The expansion was supported by a \$16 million commitment by the Spartanburg Regional Foundation.







INSPIRATIONAL LUNCHEON RAISES MORE THAN \$122,000

A crowd of 600 community members came together in October 2019 for An Uplifting Event. Attendees heard stories of hope and inspiration as well as perspectives on treatment and prevention. Speakers included breast cancer survivor Kim Toler, MD, and Steve Corso, MD, who discussed ongoing advancements in cancer treatment. The luncheon raised more than \$122,000 to support programs and services at the Bearden-Josey Center for Breast Health.

ECMO GRANT

In 2019, the Spartanburg Regional Heart Center benefited from the purchase of a second extra corporeal membrane oxygenation (ECMO) machine. Made possible by a \$125,586 Spartanburg Regional Foundation grant, this equipment provides life support for patients in crisis whose lungs and/or heart cannot function adequately on their own. It is this kind of donor-supported, state-of-the-art technology that helps our heart center offer world-class care.







HEART GALA RAISES MORE THAN \$700,000 FOR HEART CENTER

More than 800 community members came together for Spartanburg Regional Foundation's inaugural Heart Gala – *Welcome to Wonderland*.

Under the leadership of event co-chairs Dr. Sidney Fulmer and Kathy Dunleavy, attendees enjoyed great food, drinks, music, and dancing as well as a live auction.

Sponsorships, ticket sales and other contributions raised more than \$700,000 to benefit the Spartanburg Regional Heart Center. These proceeds will support new technology, specialized training, preventive screenings and community awareness programs.

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

A SPECIAL WAY TO THANK HEALTHCARE HEROES

Foundation provides take-home family holiday meals for 10,000 SRHS associates

2020 was an unprecedented and difficult year for health workers. To show appreciation and support for our local healthcare heroes, Spartanburg Regional Foundation provided a packaged holiday meal in December for each SRHS employee – 10,000 in all. The meals fed up to six family members and included a holiday protein of turkey or ham, gravy, macaroni and cheese, green beans, rolls, and a pumpkin pie.

The Foundation's restaurant partners were Hub City Hospitality Group – which includes Willy Taco, FR8yard, and Flock Shop – as well as Cribbs Catering. To serve the entire SRHS team, there were eight pick-up locations throughout the health system.

"It's been so tough for everybody this year with COVID-19," said Phyllis Osborne, a nurse with Woodruff Manor nursing home. "To have these wonderful meals for our families – we're so grateful and very, very appreciative."

Grant supports forensic nursing program

Appropriate treatment of sexual assault victims in the emergency setting is essential for the recovery and long-term wellness of those patients. It is also important for the collection of evidence that may be used by law enforcement in court.

To that end, Spartanburg Regional Foundation awarded the Spartanburg Regional Emergency Center a \$28,506 grant in 2019 to expand its forensic nursing program at the Spartanburg Medical Center – Mary Black and Cherokee Medical Center campuses. A 2018 Foundation grant supported development of the program at the main hospital campus Emergency Center.

Jennifer Combs, who directs the team of Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs), said more than 200 victims of sexual assault were treated at the Emergency Center in 2018. About half of those were children.

As SANE services have expanded in 2019 and 2020, the caseload has grown to include domestic



assault and family violence victims, Combs said. By the beginning of December, more than 540 patients had been served in 2020.

Combs said the nurses provide holistic care that goes beyond an emergency room exam to include coordination with law enforcement and, in some cases, referrals to non-profit shelters or organizations that advocate for victims. "If we can make a difference for one patient, it has made our job worthwhile," Combs said.

2020 GRANTS

Dental clinic fills "a tremendous void"

Our teeth can affect our daily life more than we think. A toothache can make you feel miserable. Poor oral hygiene can be socially stigmatizing and affect employment.

Meanwhile, periodontal disease is linked to a wide range of health problems, including cancer and cardiovascular complications.

Supported by a \$285,000 grant from the Spartanburg Regional Foundation, Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System unveiled the Spartanburg Community Dental Center in the summer of 2020 to serve uninsured and recovery program adults. Doctors in dental residency help staff the clinic.

"For years, we have recognized that dental care is a key for the health of our community, and there has been a tremendous void," said Chuck Morrow, MD, who serves as Spartanburg Regional's chief medical officer and vice president for medical affairs.





Uninsured patients suffering from tooth decay or other oral health problems routinely show up in the emergency room, Morrow said. The new clinic will enable Spartanburg Regional to connect these patients with the care they need.

Spartanburg Medical Center President Phil Feisal said the new clinic is important, bringing value to the health system and community.

"There has been a long-standing need to improve access to dental care services for the underserved and uninsured in our community," Feisal said. "Spartanburg Regional has always served as a 'safety net' provider in our community, and this comprehensive dental clinic will do the same."

"Each year, our grant program supports initiatives that promote innovation and strategic improvements," said Kristy Caradori, executive director of the Foundation. "This is such an exciting project; we know that it addresses a serious need for our community and health system."
